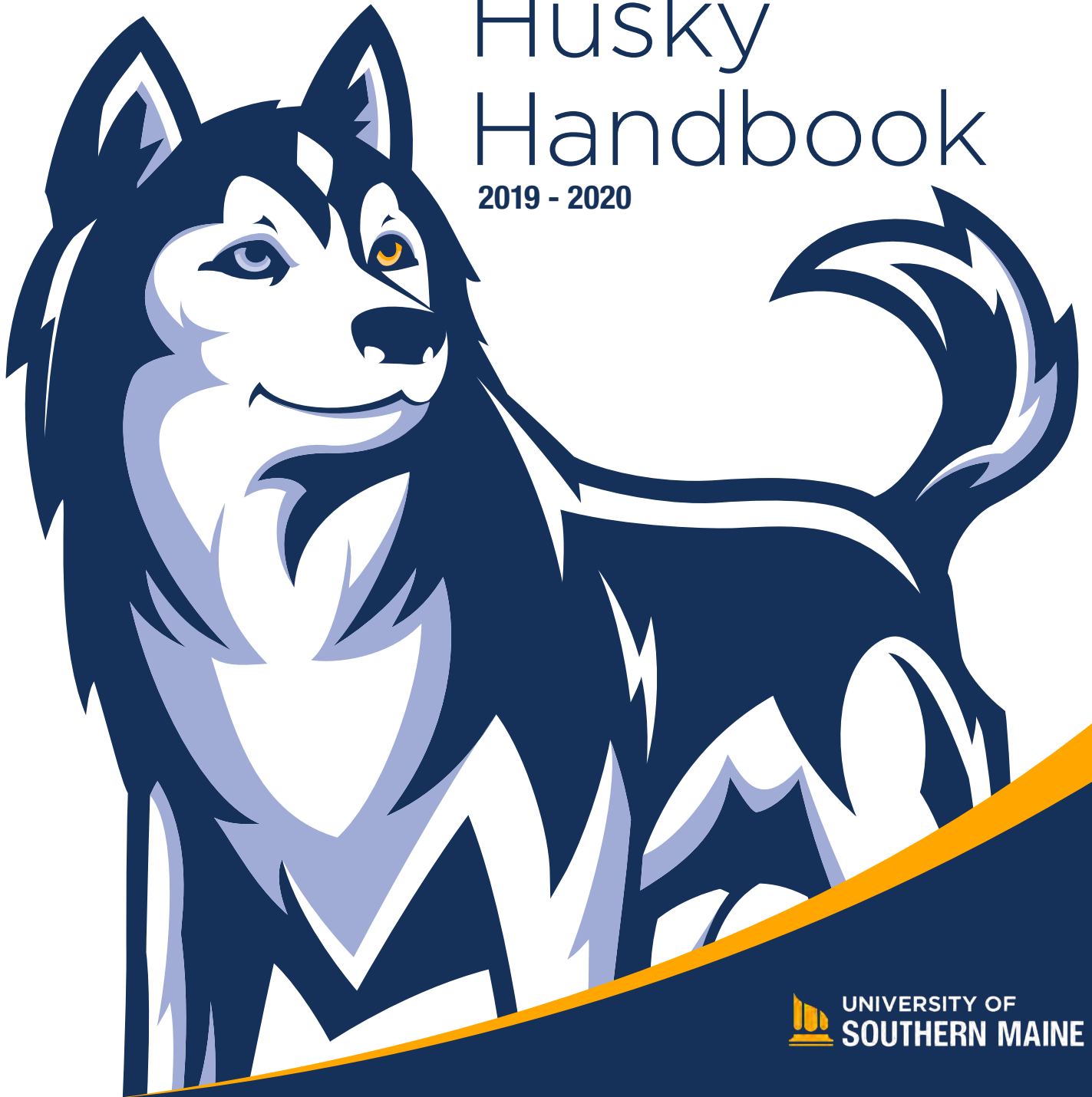

Check Your Email

Students are required to check their @maine.edu email frequently in order to stay current with University related communication.

MaineStreet

This is the primary hub for all student information including class schedule, financials, grades, contact information, and more. Students access MaineStreet via the MyUSM campus portal.

Password

USM account passwords must be reset every 180 days. Reminders are sent to students at their university email address. Passwords should never be shared.



Safety on Campus

Public Safety (usm.maine.edu/police)

USM Public Safety is responsible for providing police services on our Portland and Gorham campuses. The USM Police Department is a full-service police agency, staffed by Maine Criminal Justice Academy certified police officers responsible for keeping the peace, preventing crime, and delivering a variety of public safety related services including: community policing and crime prevention services, personal safety programs, criminal investigations and 24-hour campus police coverage on foot, bike, and marked police vehicles. Public Safety personnel are available to serve students at all times and are dispatched from our headquarters on the Gorham campus.

Emergency Line: Dial 911 from any on-campus phone to reach Public Safety dispatch in an emergency. A call placed to 911 from a cell phone will be answered by the Maine Department of Public Safety Communications Center and will be forwarded to USM Police.

Emergency Call Boxes: Calls placed from the Emergency Call Boxes located around the campus and elevators will come into our communications center on the 911 line and will be answered immediately. An officer will be dispatched to the call location.

USM Alert

"USM Alert" is the University's text and email notification system for emergency alerts, weather closings, and other critical information for the University community.

University Timeline

1878 - Gorham Normal School founded.

1921 - Portland University opens.

1933 - Portland University merges with Portland Junior College.

1945 - Name of Gorham Normal School is changed to Gorham State Teachers College.

1947 - After closing for World War II, Portland Junior College reopens and purchases the Deering Estate, which is the current home of the Portland campus.

1957 - Portland Junior College joins the UMaine System and becomes the University of Maine at Portland.

1964 - Name of Gorham State Teachers College is changed to Gorham State College.

1970 - University of Maine at Portland-Gorham is born from a merger of Gorham State College and the University of Maine at Portland.

1978 - Name is changed to University of Southern Maine.

1988 - USM expands to open a Lewiston-Auburn campus.

Leadership in Academic Affairs & Student Affairs

Academic Affairs

At USM there are four (4) different colleges that make up the academic side of the university. Each college is organized by academic programs and is lead by an Academic Dean and Associate Deans.

- Helping to clarify academic program related questions.
- Reviewing and providing signatures for Prior Approval Form & other academic documents requiring signature of a Dean.
- Determining Academic Probationary status.
- Reviewing student appeals of academic related decisions.

Student Affairs

At USM there is an entire division of the university that is focused on student support and advocacy. Much like the academic colleges, this division is lead by a Dean and Assistant Dean.

Examples of Dean of Students (DOS) responsibilities:

- Advocating for the needs of students.
- Helping to connect students to campus and community resources.
- Supporting students experiencing difficulty that may be impacting their personal or academic life. However, DOS do not make academic related decisions.
- Advocating for students in a medical crisis or emergency situation.
- Overseeing departments and staff members who are part of the Student Affairs division.

University Terminology

College life can be full of new words, unfamiliar phrases, and concepts. To help, we have put together a list of common USM terms and abbreviations so all students may share a common language.

ACS (Advising & Course Selection): The required 1-on-1 appointment that all new students have with an Academic Advisor before the start of their first semester. At this meeting, advisors help new students select courses, discuss academic and professional goals, and review degree requirements.

Add/Drop: A period of time at the start of the academic term where students can adjust their schedule. Specific dates for each class can be reviewed by clicking the calendar icon next to class sections in the MaineStreet Student Center.

Advisor: Each student is assigned a faculty advisor and a professional advisor who will encourage and support individual development and assist in progressing through their degree program.

Bachelor's Degree: 120+ credit undergraduate program.

Blackboard: This is the course delivery tool chosen and supported by the University of Maine System for online education. It can be used for online courses or to supplement face-to-face classes.

BSO (Board of Student Organizations): The governing body of USM's independent student groups.

Champ: Our beloved Husky mascot is Champ! Champ the Husky embodies the spirit of USM and is celebrated at sports events, campus gatherings, or whenever members of the Husky Pack get together.

CLEP (College Level Examination Program): An exam taken in place of a course. Prior Learning Credit is granted to a student who receives a satisfactory score on a CLEP examination.

Colleges: USM is made up of four academic units: College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences (CAHS); College of Management and Human Service (CMHS); College of Science, Technology, and Health (CSTH); and Lewiston-Auburn College (LAC).

Commuter Student: A student who does not live in University housing.

COR 101 (Co-Curricular Learning Lab): Co-Curricular Learning Labs provide first-year students with engaged learning experiences. The labs connect students with peers, faculty, staff, and the broader community through projects and activities on and off campus.

Core Curriculum: A program of required courses designed to ensure that USM students receive a broad-based liberal arts education.

Course Catalog: Annual University electronic publication with details concerning academic matters, available programs, major requirements, and individual course descriptions.

Co-Curricular: Activities, events, programs, or other opportunities outside of the classroom that complement or connect to academic concepts.

Co-Requisite: A course or courses required to be taken simultaneously.

Dean: An administrative officer in charge of a college, school, or division of the University.

Dean's List: An academic honor determined each semester. For a full list of requirements, consult the Course Catalog.

Department Chair: A faculty member in charge of a particular academic department. For example, the English Department or Communication Department.

Elective Credit: Courses taken outside the student's Core Curriculum and major requirements. Elective credits make up part of the requirements needed to complete a degree program and they enable a student to take classes to enhance their education.

ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages): These courses are designed for students whose second or other language is English.

EYE (Entry Year Experience): A course that assists students in their transition to college with an emphasis on critical reading, thinking, and writing.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid):

The form that needs to be prepared annually by current and prospective college students (undergraduate and graduate) to determine their eligibility for student financial aid.

FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act):

The federal law designed to protect the privacy of a student's educational records.

Full-Time Student: One who is enrolled in 12 or more credit hours.

GPA (Grade Point Average): Each semester a new GPA is calculated for each student, averaging the current semester's grades and the previous GPA.

Help Desk: A resource that assists students in problem-solving technology and account issues. Also known as the Technology Support Center.

Homecoming/Family & Friends Weekend: An annual weekend of exciting events that brings together USM students, faculty, staff, alumni, community members, friends, and family.

Husky Fest: Established in 2001, this annual fall semester kick-off party is part of Welcome Week and includes events and activities for students. It follows a tradition that began in 1968 on the campus of Gorham State Teachers College. Known as Husky Huzzah, the events were preparations for winter carnivals during which a "mayor" and "queen" were elected.

Incomplete: Grade option received when a student has not completed coursework by the end of the semester. Faculty approval is needed.

Interdisciplinary: A course that is team-taught by a group of faculty from different departments.

International Study/Study Abroad: A program that provides students with the opportunity to spend a semester or two internationally.

Internship: An opportunity for students to earn credits while gaining valuable "on-the-job" experience.

L Grade: Indicates that student stopped attending a class without officially withdrawing (computed in the GPA as equivalent to F grade).

LLC (Living Learning Community): All first-year residential students are assigned to housing based on a COR 101 class. This allows them to connect with peers, both in class and in their residential community, that share a common interest.

MaineStreet: The University's online data system where students can access information on grades, assigned academic advisor, course schedules, FAFSA, student bill, and important messages.

Matriculated: Students who have applied to USM and have been accepted as degree candidates.

METRO Bus: A public bus route called the Husky Line connects the Portland and Gorham Campuses. See page 41 for info.

Non-Matriculated/Non-Degree: A student taking courses at USM but not formally admitted to a degree program.

Part-Time Student: A student that is enrolled in fewer than 12 credit hours.

Pass/Fail: Grading option for students who want to broaden their educational experience. Students will receive "P/F" grades on their transcripts.

Prerequisite: Some courses require that students demonstrate skills or the successful completion of another course prior to enrollment.

Probation (Academic): If a student's academic performance is below good standing, but not low enough to require suspension, the student will be placed on academic probation.

RA (Resident Assistant): A student staff member that serves as a mentor and guide to their residents. They focus on fostering community in residence halls.

RD (Resident Director): A live-in professional focused on ensuring that the residence halls are safe, secure, clean environments that allow students to pursue educational goals as well as personal growth and development.



USM offers year-round on-campus housing in six residence halls located on the Gorham campus: usm.maine.edu/reslife

Readiness Requirement: Minimum level of skill in writing and math must be demonstrated by all students.

Registrar: Head of the department responsible for maintaining student records for all current and past students. They are also responsible for all of the databases for student and course-related records, getting students registered for courses, maintaining the record of their grades and prerequisites, and producing transcripts showing the accurate record of their academic careers.

Registration: During Priority Registration, continuing degree students register for their next semester courses in priority order (seniors first, juniors second, etc.). Newly matriculated students register during Advising & Course Selection (ACS) appointments. During Open Registration, non-matriculated students and degree students who did not advance register may register for classes.

Residence Hall: On campus housing offered by the university. Sometimes called “Dorm” or “Res Hall”.

Residential Student: A student who lives in on-campus university housing.

SHIP (Student Health Insurance Plan): The University of Maine System requires proof of health insurance as a condition of enrollment for all students. If students have other insurance coverage they may waive SHIP. Students that do not waive out by the deadline will be automatically charged and enrolled in the plan. Students who have insurance and do not want the SHIP must fill out the waiver form in person or online by October 1.

Student Conduct Code: A University of Maine System document that outlines University policies and provides students with guidelines for appropriate behavior on campus. The Code is a contract between the student and the University and it applies on and off campus.

Student Identification Number: The unique number that is assigned to each student in the University of Maine System. This number stays with a student and is used at all UMaine schools for identification. This number can be found in the Student Center in MaineStreet.

Suspension (Academic): Students who have two consecutive semesters of probationary standing may be suspended at the discretion of the academic dean of their college.

Syllabus: A document that outlines important information about a course written by the professor or instructor.

Textbook Buyback: When the University Store buys back textbooks from students. This can be done at the University store or online at usm.ecampus.com. Books can be sold daily; however, better prices are normally offered at End-of-Semester Buybacks, which occur the last week of classes as well as the week of finals for the Fall and Spring semesters.

Transcript: Document of academic work and student status. An official transcript of the academic record must be stamped with the Registrar’s signature and embossed with the seal of the University.

Tutoring: Tutoring is available in most academic courses, as well as through the Learning Commons in Portland, Gorham, and Lewiston-Auburn.

URSUS (University Resources Serving Users

Statewide): A computer-based catalog of all books, journals, and periodicals contained in the libraries of the University of Maine System, and many others throughout the state, both public and private. URSUS also accesses libraries at other universities in the U.S., other countries, and throughout the world.

W Grade: Indicates a student officially withdrew from a class by the deadline set by the Academic Calendar. W grade has no effect on the GPA, but could impact Financial Aid eligibility.

Work Study: Money that is awarded as part of an eligible student’s Financial Aid package. Students earn this money at hourly paid positions. USM has Federal Work Study with both on and off campus employers. Most jobs are located on campus at University offices and departments. Available positions cover a wide variety of jobs.

Graduation Requirements

In addition to the minimum requirements of 120 credits for a baccalaureate degree, a candidate must:

- (a) receive passing grades in courses required by the University, the school or college, and the major department;
- (b) complete the number of credit hours required by the school or college in which the student is registered;
- (c) achieve a cumulative average grade point average of not less than 2.00 (some majors require a higher GPA for graduation);
- (d) meet the requirements of the major department; and
- (e) complete an Application for Degree on MaineStreet or with the Office of the Registration and Scheduling Services at the beginning of the semester of graduation.

Responsibility for successfully completing the requirements of the program resides with the student.

USM Core (usm.maine.edu/core)

Students must also complete the USM Core, which offers students distinctively integrative and practical learning experiences that prepare them for successful citizenship in a complex and dynamic world. Special strengths of the USM Core include active learning that occurs both within and outside of the classroom, opportunities, and incentives for students to connect their learning in the major with their Core education, and learning experiences that build knowledge and skills throughout the student's academic career. Major Requirements

Majors require students to earn varying numbers of credit hours, ranging from 36 up to 90 or more hours. These required hours are established by each academic department. The University catalog provides a list of majors and their individual requirements.

Electives

Students can choose from a variety of courses to fulfill elective requirements. Elective courses give students the opportunity to expand their education beyond their chosen major. The number of elective credits needed is determined by subtracting the number of Core credits and major credits from the total credits needed to graduate. The difference is the number of elective credits needed.

Degree Progress Report

Students may access a degree progress report through their Student Center in USM's MaineStreet. This is helpful when planning a course sequence.

Semester Credits

Each college level course (100-level or higher) that a student completes successfully at USM contributes a certain number of credits to their record. Credits per course vary from 0.5–5. Students are considered “full-time” with a credit load of 12 or more hours per semester. Students enrolled in fewer than 12 credits are considered “part-time”.



To graduate, a student must apply for Graduation through their Student Center in MaineStreet at the beginning of the semester of their intended degree completion.

Grade Point Average (GPA)

To compute the grade point average for a semester, first, multiply the grade points earned in each course by the number of credit hours assigned to that course. The resulting product is the number of quality points for that course. Then divide the total number of quality points earned during the semester by the total number of credits carried in that semester (exclude classes where grades are P, H, LP, I and W). The result is carried out to two decimal places to produce the grade point average for that semester.

To compute the cumulative grade point average, divide the total quality points earned by the total credits attempted in all semesters.

Dean's List

At the end of the fall and spring semesters, full-time, undergraduate degree students (defined as those who completed 12 credit hours or more, with a minimum of 12 letter-graded credits A-F, unless specific Pass/Fail credits are required by the student's program), and excluding developmental credits with course numbers less than 100, with grade point average of 3.6 or above will be placed on the Dean's List.

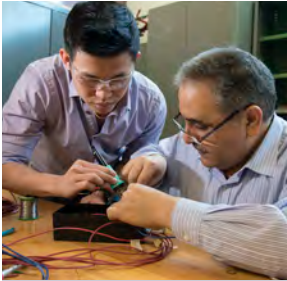
Students with Incomplete or Missing Grades (I or MG) at the point when the Dean's List is produced (approximately 35 days after the end of a fall or spring semester) will not be eligible for the Dean's List. Students who attend both the fall and the spring semesters as part-time degree students and who meet the above full-time Dean's List criteria when the fall and spring semesters are combined are eligible for the academic year Dean's List at the end of the spring semester. A notation will be made on the transcript of those who earn the academic year Dean's List distinction.

Minimum Grades and Academic Action

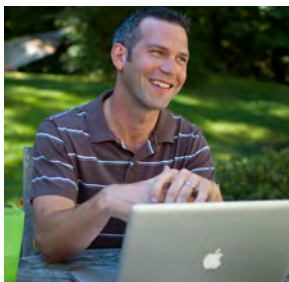

Important Tips for Financial Aid and Billing

Paying for college can be confusing and costly: USM Student Financial Services is here to help! Check out some of our favorite tips:

File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) every year! File online at fafsa.gov starting October 1 and by January 15 to be considered for the best financial aid package.

Apply for USM Scholarships each year at usm.maine.edu/scholarships. Review the scholarship portal beginning October 1 to see due dates for scholarships for the next academic year.

Check the MaineStreet “To Do List” and your USM email regularly. We will add items to the “To Do List” on MaineStreet and email student USM email accounts if additional information is needed to process their FAFSA.

Students are assigned a financial aid counselor based on their last name. Students can find our staff list and your assigned financial aid counselor by clicking on “People” at usm.maine.edu/sfs. We take walk-in meetings on all USM campuses if your financial aid counselor is located on a different campus.

Report any expected outside payments or scholarships to your financial aid counselor. We are required to include outside financial assistance in your financial aid package.

One paper bill is mailed each semester. After the paper bill is mailed, adjustments to course schedule, housing, or meal plan will result in changes to the bill that may require additional payments. Students must keep track of changes to their student billing account on MaineStreet.

We offer a payment plan to help students manage the cost of attending. Students pay 5 installments over the semester with a \$30 non-refundable enrollment fee and down payment due at the time of enrollment.

Students should begin to use Federal Work Study funding by October 1. Work Study funds may be removed from the financial aid package if a student has not been hired and begun earning the funds by October 1 of each academic year.

The Deadline to waive the USM Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) is October 1. If taking 9 credits or more undergraduate students are automatically billed for the health insurance plan and must submit a waiver at usm.maine.edu/uhrs to document their coverage by October 1 to have the charge removed. Students starting in the Spring semester should consult the website for specific spring waiver deadline.

Most types of Financial Aid, such as student loans, require a minimum of six credits of enrollment per semester for undergraduate students. Merit Scholarships awarded by Admissions require full-time enrollment, completing 30 credit hours per academic year.

University of Maine System Student Conduct Code:

It is the purpose of the University of Maine System Student Conduct Code to promote the pursuit of activities that contribute to the intellectual, ethical, and physical development of the individuals under the auspices of the University of Maine System (hereinafter referred to as "University") and the individual campuses. It is also the purpose of this Code to ensure the safety of persons engaging in those pursuits; to protect the free and peaceful expression of ideas; and to assure the integrity of various academic processes. It is expected that students will conduct their affairs with proper regard for the rights of others and of the University.

Acceptable Use of Information Resources Policy:

USM supports open access to information resources, including the internet, to the greatest extent possible. In return, the University expects users of information resources to be aware of and act in compliance with all relevant federal and state laws, local ordinances, and University policies.

USM Alcohol and Other Drugs Policy:

The primary goal of this policy is the health and safety of all members of the USM community. USM values and promotes an environment of legal and lower risk alcohol use and supports alcohol-free environments. The unlawful manufacture, possession, use or distribution of drugs or controlled substances is strictly prohibited. All students and guests are held responsible for behavior in violation of this policy. The University provides education on alcohol and other drug use through programs, support, and resources.

Campus Speakers:

The purpose of this policy is to balance the safety of the entire campus community while ensuring the free exercise of First Amendment rights of those who wish to participate in events hosted at USM.

Confidentiality of Student Records Policy:

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is designed to protect the privacy of parents and students with regard to access of records. Once a student reaches the age of 18 or matriculates in a postsecondary institution, their parents no longer have an automatic legal right to examine their educational records without documented permission of the student.

Email Communication Policy:

In order to meet the academic and administrative needs of the University community, the University of Southern Maine has established email as an official and primary means of communication to all of its students, accepted and/or enrolled. Students are expected to check their email on a frequent (daily) basis, as they do their USPS mail, in order to stay current with University related communications.

Good Samaritan Policy:

While the University cannot guarantee absolute immunity from sanctions associated with violations of the Student Conduct Code, efforts may be made to reduce sanctions for some alcohol and other drug offenses for "Good Samaritans." This may be applicable when students actively sought medical attention for themselves or others at the time of an incident, or when students intervene or report violations of the Sex Discrimination, Sexual Harassment, Sexual Assault, Relationship Violence, Stalking, and Retaliation policy.

Hazing Policy:

No person or organization shall create, or permit to exist, any situation that recklessly or intentionally endangers the mental or physical health of a student enrolled at any institution of the University of Maine System.

HIV/AIDS Policy:

The USM HIV/AIDS policy was established to protect both the rights of individuals infected with HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus) as well as the health and safety of all others at the institution. USM will not discriminate in any manner against any person who is infected with HIV. This includes admissions, facilities access, hiring, housing, promotion, tenure, and/or termination.

Illegal Downloading and Uploading of Copyrighted Material:

It is against policy to access, use, copy, or make available to others any copyright-protected digital material and computer software except as permitted under copyright law or by specific license.

Missing Residential Student Policy and Protocol:

In accordance with the requirements of the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA), USM provides students who are residing in on-campus housing the option of identifying an individual (a confidential contact person) in addition to their emergency contact to be notified by USM in the event that the student is determined to be missing for a period of more than 24 hours.

Residence Halls Policies:

Students are required to read and adhere with all policies concerning living on campus. Residents are expected to comply with all federal and state laws, city ordinances and University policies. Violations of any policies can result in losing the privilege to live in residential housing.

Sex Discrimination, Sexual Harassment, Sexual Assault, Relationship Violence, Stalking, and Retaliation Policy (Title IX):

The University of Maine System and USM are committed to providing a safe environment which promotes the dignity and worth of each member of the community. In complying with the letter and the spirit of applicable laws, including Title IX, and in pursuing its own goals of diversity, the University does not discriminate on the basis of sex in employment, education, and all other programs and activities. For this reason, the University will not tolerate sex discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, or retaliation in any form. All conduct of this nature is considered a violation of policy.

Student Academic Policies:

All students of the University are expected to be honest in their academic endeavors. All academic work should be performed in a manner which will provide an honest reflection of the knowledge and abilities of each student. Any breach of academic honesty should be regarded as a serious offense by all members of the academic community.

University of Southern Maine Tobacco-Free Campus Policy:

USM is dedicated to fostering a culture of wellness through the promotion, education, and support of a tobacco-free campus to provide a safe, healthy, and clean environment for our community to learn, work, and live.

Use of USM Facility Policy:

The primary use of all USM facilities and grounds is for purposes related to the University's mission. University instruction, research, service, and operational needs take precedence over any other use of University facilities and grounds.

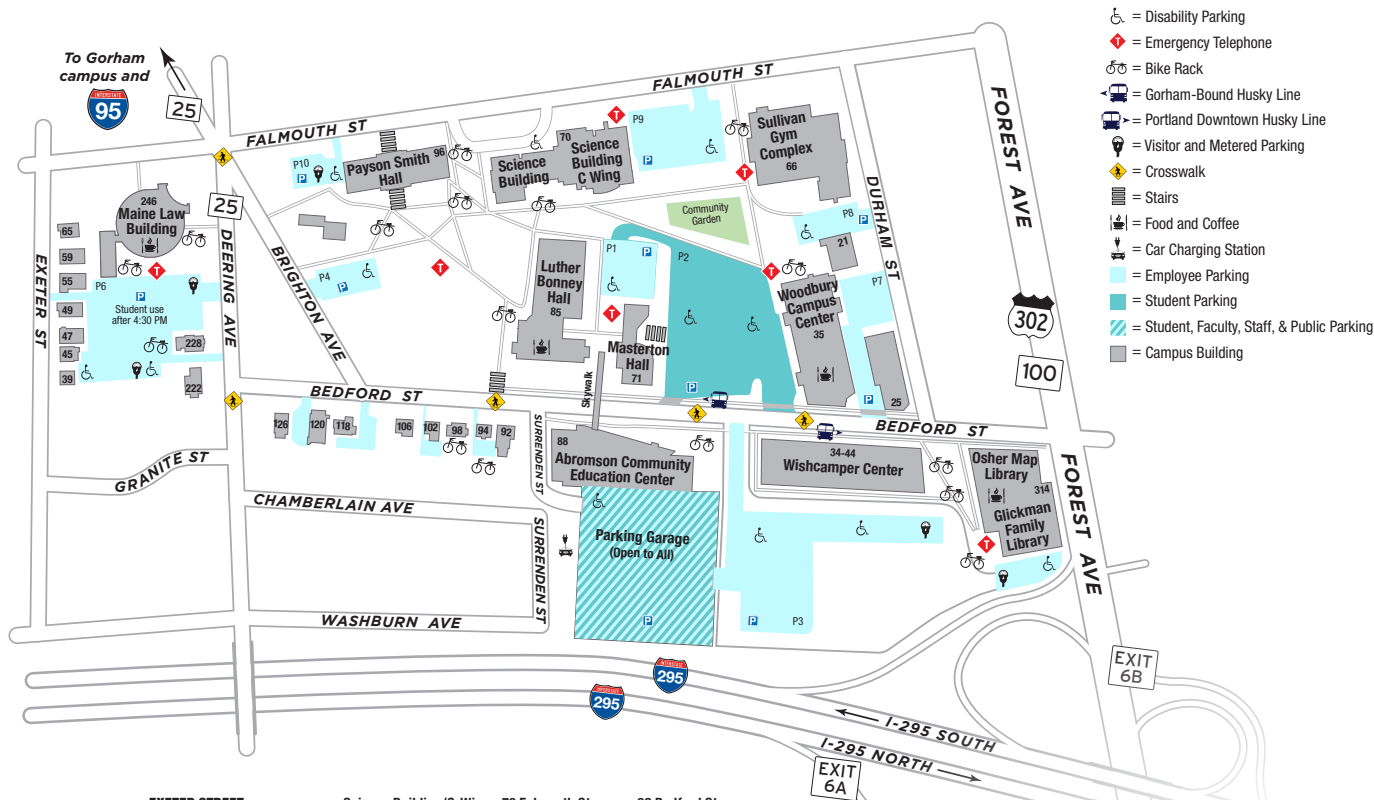

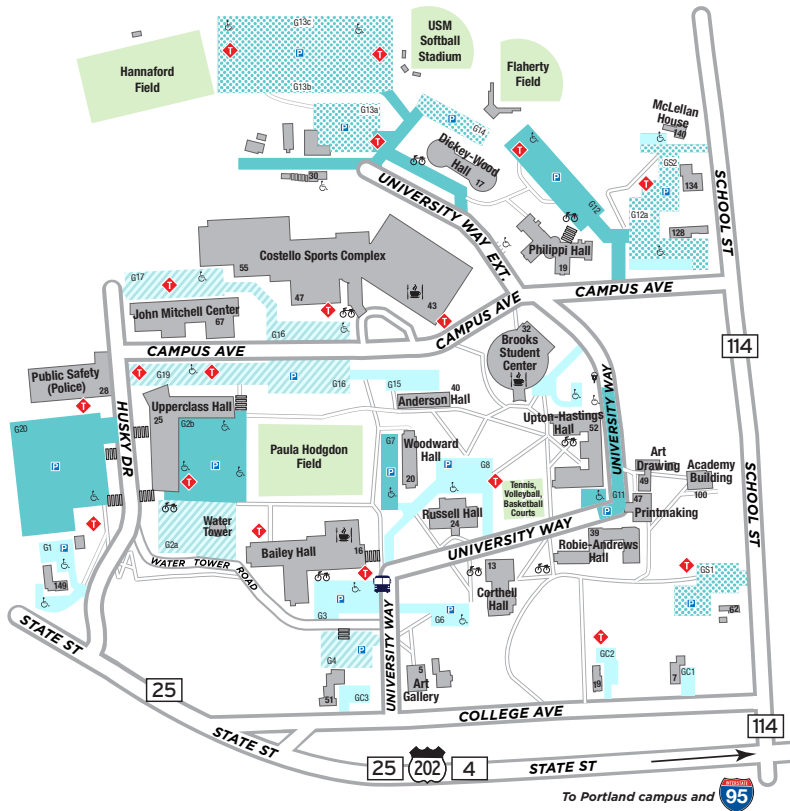
