THE PAS

GATEWAY TO NORTHERN MANITOBA

The Pas campus is located in one of the oldest and most striking settlements in northern Manitoba. Incorporated in 1912, the Town of The Pas was a traditional trading spot for Indigenous peoples and settlers. Today, the town thrives as a vital regional service centre with a diversified economic base in agriculture, forestry, industry, transportation, and tourism.

The Pas enjoys a long and positive relationship with its neighbours on the Opaskwayak Cree Nation, one of Canada's most progressive Indigenous communities.

In each of its four distinct seasons, The Pas offers unique recreational and cultural activities. Outdoor enthusiasts find themselves right at home here. The area's raw natural beauty attracts visitors from around the world — particularly to nearby Clearwater Lake Provincial Park, featuring one of the most pristine bodies of water in North America.

OUR CAMPUS

The Oscar Lathlin library is a contemporary research facility that includes computer workstations, study areas, private meeting rooms, and a campus commons area for students.

Our residence at The Pas is attached to campus so students have direct access to classrooms. Students also benefit from an onsite student laundry facility, as well as a cafeteria, gym, and fitness area. The campus is within short walking distance of the community wellness center, arena, curling rink, ball field, running track, swimming pool, and community center.

For those who enjoy the outdoors, The Pas has a great deal to offer, with miles of walking trails just off campus.

THOMPSON HUB OF THE NORTH

Thompson's natural surroundings are rich with culture, history and the spirit of the people who live here. The city is located on the Burntwood River in north-central Manitoba. This is traditional Nisichawayasihk Cree Nation territory and homeland of the Métis people, both celebrated for their warm northern hospitality.

Thompson is anchored in the rugged Canadian shield and boreal forest. While the historical economic growth of the area has been rooted in mining, the city is considered to be the regional centre for health, education, government, transportation, and retail services.

OUR CAMPUS

The Thompson campus started serving students in 2014. Convenient and contemporary, the site offers all the amenities of a thriving urban centre surrounded by pristine wilderness. This is a great place to live, study, play, and raise a family.

The campus is connected directly to the Thompson Regional Community Centre, a state-of-the-art recreational facility that features two rinks, a walking track, a curling club, a gym, and a fully-equipped fitness centre. It's a convenient place to stay in shape and clear your head between classes year-round.

UCN's Thompson campus is also located close to R.D. Parker Collegiate, the local high school. High school students are able to easily participate in UCN public events and cultural opportunities.



HOUSING

FAMILY HOUSING, APARTMENTS AND CARROLL HALL

UCN offers housing to meet the needs of single students and students with families at both The Pas and Thompson campuses. UCN Family Housing consists of 24 units on both Thompson and The Pas Campus. The units come with a stove, fridge, washer, and dryer. There are 7 four-bedroom and 17 three-bedroom units. These units are alcohol, drug, and pet free environments. Family Housing is located across from UCN on both campuses.

HOUSING AT THOMPSON CAMPUS

The Copper Apartments are made up of two secure buildings located only a 15-minute walk from campus.

11 COPPER

This building features 19 one- or two-bedroom units. More than half are furnished. Laundry facilities are located on the first floor.

21 COPPER

This 19-unit building features bachelor, one- and two-bedroom apartments. More than half the units are furnished. Students share accommodations in the two-bedroom units. Students may request specific roommates on their application. If possible, the resident attendant will accommodate the request. Laundry facilities are located on the first floor.

HOUSING AT THE PAS CAMPUS

Carroll Hall is a popular, convenient, and affordable on-campus living choice for many UCN students. The hall offers a quiet, clean and comfortable environment in which to socialize, sleep and study. The hall is an alcohol- and drug-free environment. The environment promotes a high academic success rate by providing special student supports including close student and staff interactions, social development, and peer support.

RECREATION

THE PAS CAMPUS

Enjoy the use of a fully equipped gymnasium where we host many sporting and fitness events throughout the year. Intramural sports include basketball, badminton, curling, floor hockey, and volleyball. Students have priority use of the gym through intramural programming, fitness classes, open gym time, and occasional tournaments.

We also offer winter activities such as snowshoeing and curling. UCN is just five minutes from the pristine backcountry and the Rosie Mayne cross-country ski trails. For a nominal fee, you can also access our well-equipped weight and cardio rooms for your fitness needs.

THOMPSON CAMPUS

The Student Association Council (SAC) partners with UCN and other educational institutions to promote various recreational and social activities. Students enjoy activities such as basketball, badminton, volleyball, and slo-pitch softball.

SAC also hosts such special student and family events as bowling nights, craft nights, barbeques, and fun fairs. Although the campus does not have a gym, City of Thompson facilities nearby include Mystery Mountain Ski Hill, indoor and outdoor arenas, a curling rink, ball diamonds, tennis and racquet ball courts, a golf course, and a fitness centre. Many of these sites offer student rates.



CULTURAL RESOURCES

INDIGENOUS CENTRES

UCN's Indigenous centres on both campuses are a place for all students to honor and share Indigenous cultures. Activities include sharing circle meetings, special guest speakers, and other student-initiated activities. Both centres have a lounge area, fully functioning kitchen, and space for traditional ceremonies.

ELDER PROGRAM

UCN has a long-established Elder program available within the Mamawechetotan and Ininiwi Kiskinwamakewin Centres. Elders are available for advice and counsel to staff and students.

ACCESSIBILITY

Student Accessibility Services (SAS) provides support and advocacy for students who may require accommodations. Reasonable accommodations may be provided if you have a documented physical, neurological, medical, mental health, hearing, vision, or temporary disability.



CHILD CARE CENTRES

UCN EARLY LEARNING AND CHILD CARE CENTRE THOMPSON CAMPUS

Independently operated from UCN, but located on the Thompson campus, this non-profit, communitybased child care facility licensed for 74 children from 12 weeks to 12 years of age. Our hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. Monday to Friday with the exception of statutory holidays.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS



BACHELOR OF ARTS (BA)

A BA degree provides students with a solid background in the liberal arts, helping them to gain a broad base of knowledge. Students will acquire important skills in the areas of written and oral communication, research, independent and critical thinking, problem solving, and team work. These skills arise from engagement with various academic disciplines, courses, and intellectual perspectives, and are highly sought in many employment situations, including the public, corporate and non-profit sectors. A BA degree is also invaluable for students entering professional programs such as law, education and accounting, or continuing into graduate programs.

Every degree will include a subject concentration, or major. Students may, but are not required to declare, a secondary subject concentration, or minor.

BACHELOR OF ARTS - THREE-YEAR

The major provides the opportunity to develop depth of knowledge in the chosen field of study. 90 credit hours of course study is required.

BACHELOR OF ARTS - FOUR-YEAR

The major provides the opportunity for substantial specialization in one area of study. 120 credit hours of course study is required.



BACHELOR OF ARTS - THREE & FOUR-YEAR DEGREE - MAJORS AND MINORS

BACHELOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (BBA)

A BBA degree helps students acquire important skills in the areas of management, organizations, motivation, and leadership. This 2+2 program (two years of college plus two years of university) reflects the mandate of UCN by incorporating Aboriginal and northern Manitoba perspectives in its subject areas. Students will learn how to apply decision-making processes and effective communication in public and private business enterprises.

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

This two-year diploma program provides graduates with the knowledge and skills required for small-business entrepreneurship and entry-level management positions in business, industry, and public administration. Students may choose between Accounting or Management Stream.

COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Students in this two-year diploma program receive the knowledge and skills required for a range of employment and self-employment opportunities, including contributing to the health of the natural environment, building on community resources and capacities, increasing community control and ownership, and stabilizing local and community economies.





ENGINEERING

Through a partnership with the University of Manitoba (U of M), students can take required first-year engineering courses at UCN. Admission into U of M is competitive and based on the best eight grades from the 12 possible courses completed.

OFFICE ASSISTANT

This certificate program helps students develop the proficiency in office skills needed to succeed in entry-level administrative positions. Students learn essential business skills such as computer applications, keyboarding, filing, business communications, bookkeeping, and administrative office procedures. Students may choose from one of two Office Assistant streams: Accounting or Medical Assistant.

FACULTY OF EDUCATION

KENANOW BACHELOR OF EDUCATION (B.ED.)

UCN's BED program provides a northern-based and Aboriginal-focused teacher education program. An Aboriginal perspective is evident throughout the program, which incorporates information gathered from extensive community consultations. The program meets the requirements for certification by Manitoba Education and responds to specific issues arising in our region for the education of Aboriginal and northern children and youth.

PROGRAM STREAMS BACHELOR OF EDUCATION AFTER DEGREE (BEDAD)

Prospective teachers with a degree with a minimum 90 credit hours may apply. Your official transcript is examined to confirm admission requirements are met for the after-degree program, which includes a major and minor teachable subject area, and required subject area (breadth) requirements. Should you be missing teachable or breadth requirements UCN may admit you as a special student and allow you to earn the missing requirements while taking education courses — this may extend the length of the program. Students complete 60 (61 with WMI) credit hours of education courses. Students spend a total of 24 weeks in student teaching placements. This is generally a two-year program.

BACHELOR OF ARTS AND BACHELOR OF EDUCATION INTEGRATED STREAM (BA/B.ED)

Prospective teachers without a degree may be admitted to the five-year concurrent BA/B.Ed. degree program where students earn both degrees concurrently. Students take courses in the BA program that will fulfill both BA graduation requirements (eg. 90 Total Credit Hours; General Education requirements and major or major/minor) and the B.Ed. major and minor teachable subject areas and breadth courses. Students may exit with a BA degree prior to completing the B.Ed. degree. Please refer to the Faculty of Arts, Business and Science section for information on the BA degree.





BACHELOR OF INTERDISCIPLINARY/ BACHELOR OF EDUCATION (BIDS/B.ED.)

Prospective teachers without a degree may be admitted to the five-year concurrent BIDS/B.Ed. degree program where students earn both degrees concurrently. The BIDS is not a stand-alone program from which a student may graduate — students must successfully complete the program requirements for both degrees in order to graduate.

Students take courses in the BIDS program that will fulfill both BIDS graduation requirements (eg. Total Credits) and the non-education course requirements for teacher certification with Manitoba Education. Students also complete the B.Ed. course requirements. BIDS courses are from the Faculty of Arts, Business and Science.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

This diploma program maximizes student's knowledge, skills and attitudes required for employment and advancement in the field of early childhood education. The program provides flexibility in delivery options, is implemented using adult learning principles, has opportunities for individualization, and recognizes students' existing knowledge through a "recognition of prior learning" process.

EARLY LEARNING AND CHILD CARE POST DIPLOMA CERTIFICATE (ELCC)

The Kenanow ELCC certificate program is offered in an online learning format to meet the needs of early childhood education professionals. The program provides a northern-based and Indigenous-postdiploma certificate in administration.


EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANT

This is a paraprofessional certificate program that provides individuals with the knowledge and skills to support students, teachers, counsellors and other professionals in a variety of educational settings. Graduates are able to assist students with lessons under direct supervision of classroom teachers, monitor and report to classroom teachers on student progress, assist in the preparation of learning materials and environment, and perform other support functions as required.

ABORIGINAL AND NORTHERN COUNSELLING SKILLS

Students in this certificate program receive the knowledge and skills required to offer paraprofessional counselling. The program and the courses reflect Aboriginal philosophy and culture, although elements of western counselling practice have been included where appropriate.

Note: this program is being offered online with students from a variety of locations. The skills gained are transferable to a variety of context (not just northern). The Aboriginal philosophy and approaches are critical.





FACULTY OF HEALTH

BACHELOR OF NURSING - Collaborative University College of the North Cohort

The Bachelor of Nursing (BN) program offers a solid base of nursing knowledge, hands-on clinical practice and the skills to embrace a challenging, diverse and satisfying career. This program has internationally recognized academic staff with expertise in a variety of areas, and students are given the opportunity to experience all aspects of nursing. The program is delivered in The Pas and Thompson through a collaboration with University of Manitoba.

DIPLOMA IN PRACTICAL NURSING

The UCN Diploma in Practical Nursing (DPN) program is a two-year diploma, currently offered in Swan River, Flin Flon and Thompson. The DPN program provides students with the knowledge and skills necessary to work as a professional member of the health care team and to successfully assume leadership roles.

HEALTH CARE AIDE


This six-month program prepares students to function as a health care team member in institutional and community settings. Graduates will learn the basic functional requirements of individuals and families who are experiencing commonly occurring short-term and chronic mental health, physical, emotional and spiritual challenges.

JOINT PRIMARY CARE PARAMEDIC

Students in this 10-month certificate program, offered in partnership with Criti Care EMS Academy, are instructed to the level of a primary care paramedic. The majority of prehospital emergency medical care in Manitoba is provided by these professionals. Students will develop the knowledge and skills necessary to provide emergency medical care at a level based on National Occupational Competency Profile developed by the profession, as well as additional skills and knowledge set out by the provincial regulator.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

This specialized three-term certificate helps students develop the academic, interpersonal, fitness, and other skills required for the application process in a number of careers in the justice system. The program promotes positive communication, integrity and teamwork.





SKILLED TRADES AND TECHNOLOGY

AUTOMOTIVE TECHNICIAN

This one-year certificate program helps students develop an understanding of the basic purpose, construction, operation and service of component parts and assemblies of an automobile. Graduates are required to disassemble, inspect, machine-calibrate, and reassemble motor vehicle units and components with an emphasis on health and safety in the workplace.

CARPENTRY/ WOODWORKING

Students in this one-year program learn basic carpentry knowledge and the skills to gain employment in the construction field. Students will learn all phases of the woodworking and building construction trades. Skills learned include blueprint reading, hand-tool and machine woodworking, framing, concrete forming, roofing, interior, and exterior finishing, cabinet making and stair building, with an emphasis on safety in the workplace.

CULINARY ARTS

This is a 40-week program designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills they need for employment in the field. Students will develop culinary-arts skills while working and preparing food in the UCN cafeteria.

ELECTRICAL TRADES FUNDAMENTALS

This certificate program teaches students the skills and knowledge required to become employed in the electrical field. The program also prepares students for studies in related technologies. Graduates may pursue further training in various apprenticeship streams that lead to certification as a journeyperson in the construction, industrial, power, or lineperson fields.

INTRODUCTION TO CONSTRUCTION TRADES

In this program, students are introduced to the construction trades through hands-on training in carpentry, electrical, and plumbing. Upon completion of the certificate program, students exit with the technical and job-readiness skills for employment in construction, renovations, and management and maintenance of facilities.

HEAVY DUTY MECHANICS

Students in this program receive broad-based training in the heavy-duty mechanical field. Sound theoretical training is emphasized to meet the challenges presented by complex designs found in today's on-and off-road trucks, as well as in construction and forestry equipment. Fundamental skills of the trade are reinforced through exposure to practical applications. Other areas of the program include computer applications and business management skills.





INDUSTRIAL WELDING

Learn the skills to become employed as a welding operator, welder's helper or an apprentice. This program is heavily oriented towards hands-on experience. The practical portion includes arc welding, oxyacetylene welding, brazing, G.M.A.W, G.T.A.W. and arc-air.

NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT TECHNICIAN

Students in this two-year diploma program train for a variety of employment opportunities in the field of natural resources management. The training emphasizes interrelationships among forests, water, fish and wildlife, and is designed to provide the technical skills required in the use and management of natural resources.

TRADES APPRENTICESHIPS

Offered by UCN through partnership with Apprenticeship Manitoba Workforce Development. Students can complete levels 1-4 Industrial Mechanics, levels 1-4 Industrial Electrical and levels 1-4 Carpentry.

INDUSTRIAL MECHANIC

Also known as Millwrights, install, test, remove, repair and service a wide variety of industrial machinery and equipment. Industrial Mechanics also read blueprints, drawings and manuals. Students of this program are working in the industry, attending eight weeks of technical training per level.

INDUSTRIAL ELECTRICIAN

An Industrial Electrician plans, installs, tests, inspects, troubleshoots, and services all types of industrial electrical equipment vital to the operation of commercial and industrial businesses. Students of this program are working in the industry attending 10 weeks of technical training per level.

CARPENTRY

Carpenters work on a wide variety of tasks associated with building and repairing whole, or parts of, buildings and other structures made of wood, wood substitutes, steel, and other materials. Students of this program are working in the industry, attending 10 weeks technical training for level 1 and eight weeks of training for each of levels 2, 3, and 4.
